What Should the Settings Be For a Normal Photo ?

Most Important

- Flash – Options (Auto, On, & Off) – Your discretion
- Live View – (Auto, On, Off) – Leave on
- Aspect Ratio – Leave at 4:3
- Timer (Off, 3 sec, or 10 sec) – Leave off unless necessary for special shot
- Filters – Many options – Leave on default
- Only two important ones to consider for the basic photographer
 - Flash
 - Live
- Other settings/options for advanced iphones will be shown in the appendix

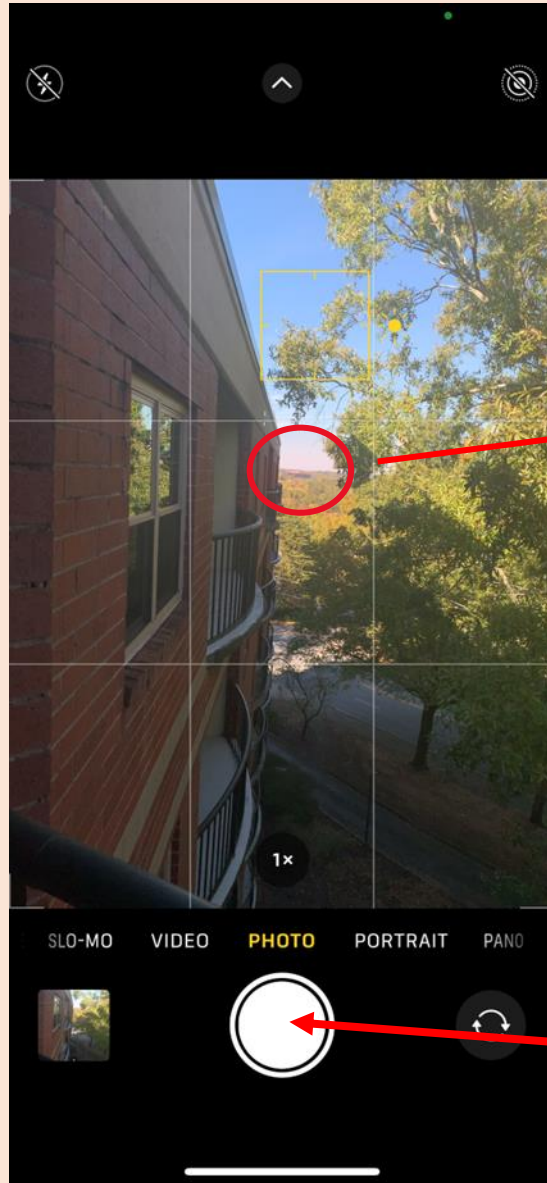

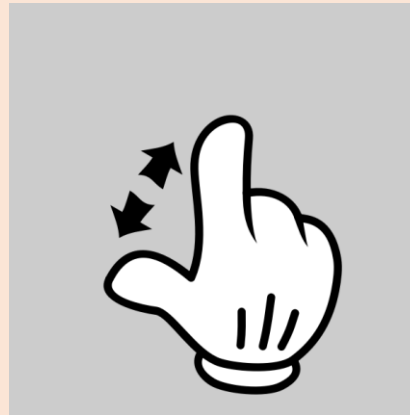


Changing Zoom in Photo Mode – Screen Shots

Normal View



If desired, use fingers to enlarge photo as much as you want up to a max of 10X – 15X the normal view



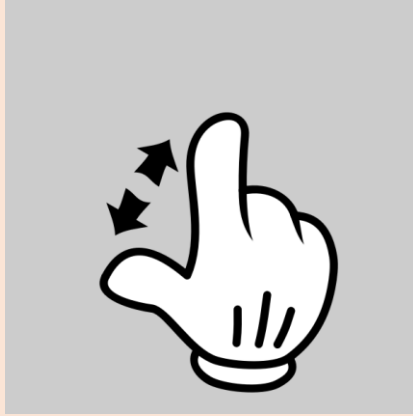
Shutter Release

Changing Zoom in Photo Mode – Screen Shots

To Zoom in on photo



Use two fingers on screen

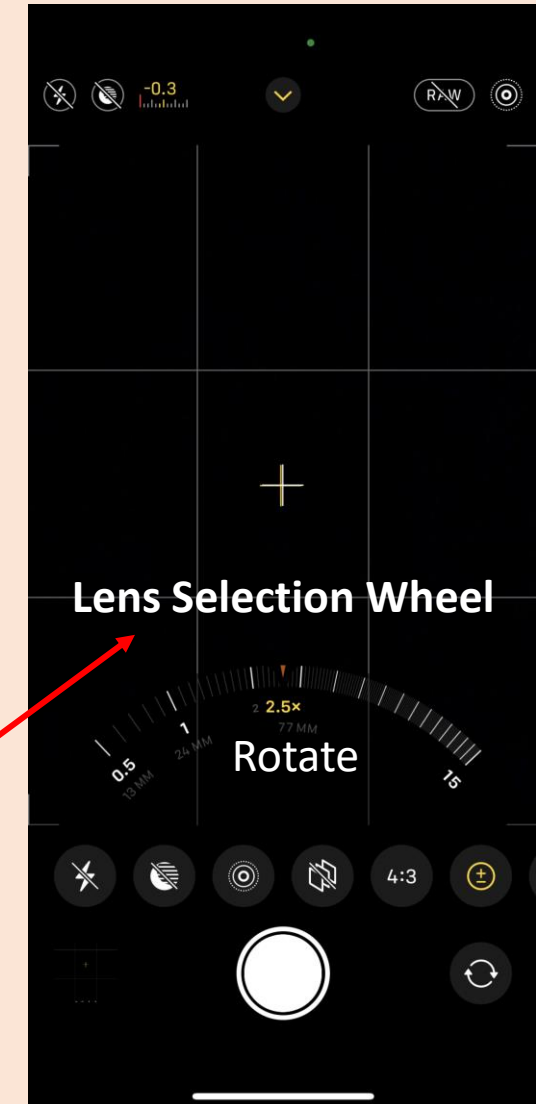
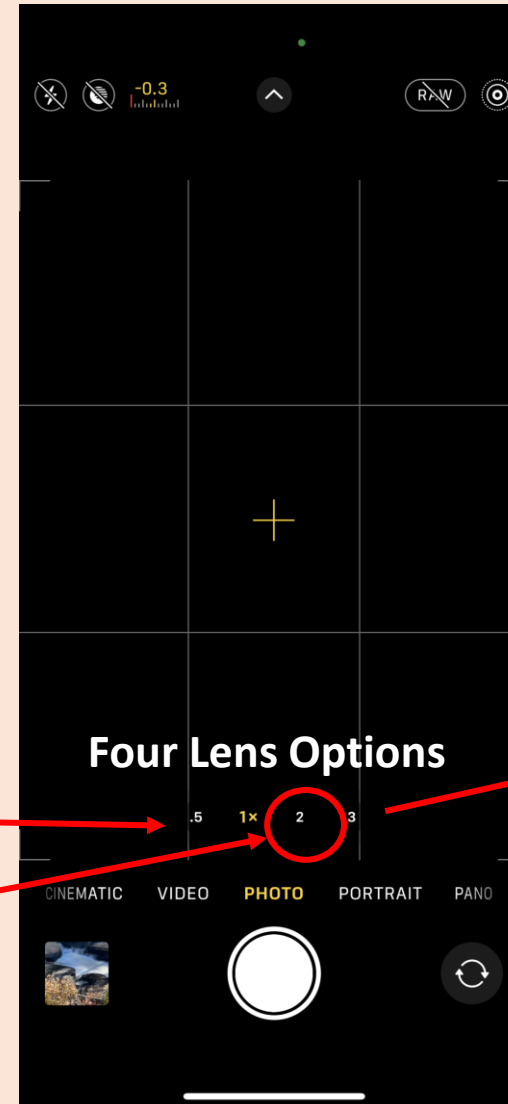
OR

*Change Lenses

OR

*Rotate Lens Selection Wheel

* Later Model iPhones



Manually Change Focus Point & Exposure in Photo Mode



Tap screen where you want a new focus point. A yellow box appears on the screen.



Slide finger up or down on screen next to yellow box to make photo lighter or darker. I made it darker.

Portrait Mode

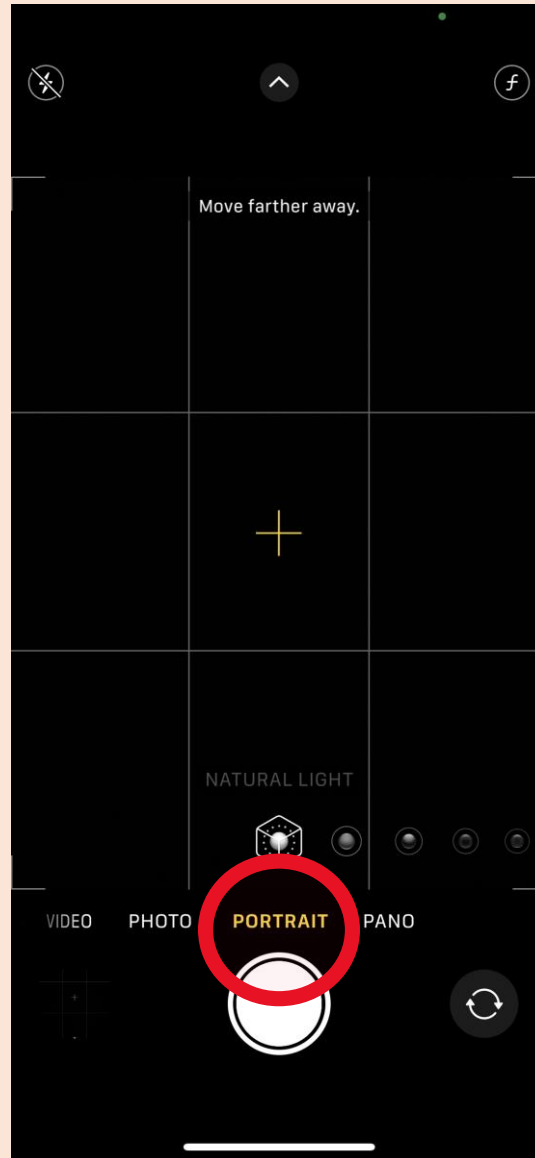
Not Just for Photographing People

Blurs The Background to Draw Attention to The Subject

Screen Shot Portrait Mode

Portrait Mode is somewhat complicated with many options.

Appendix has detailed explanations



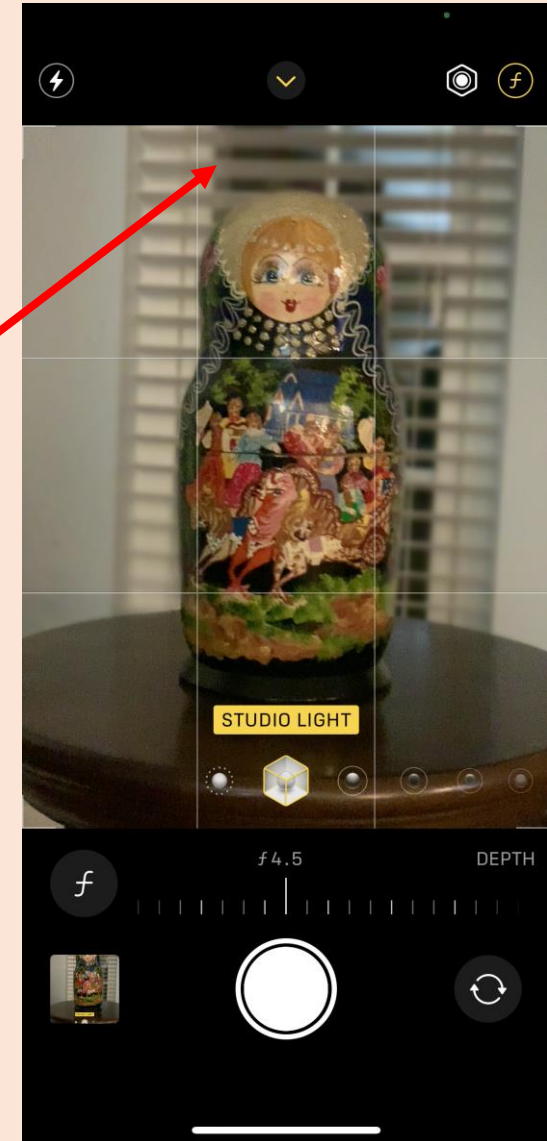
Portrait Mode Default Screen Shot



Normal Photo Mode

Background becomes blurry.

Why? – To bring focus to the subject.



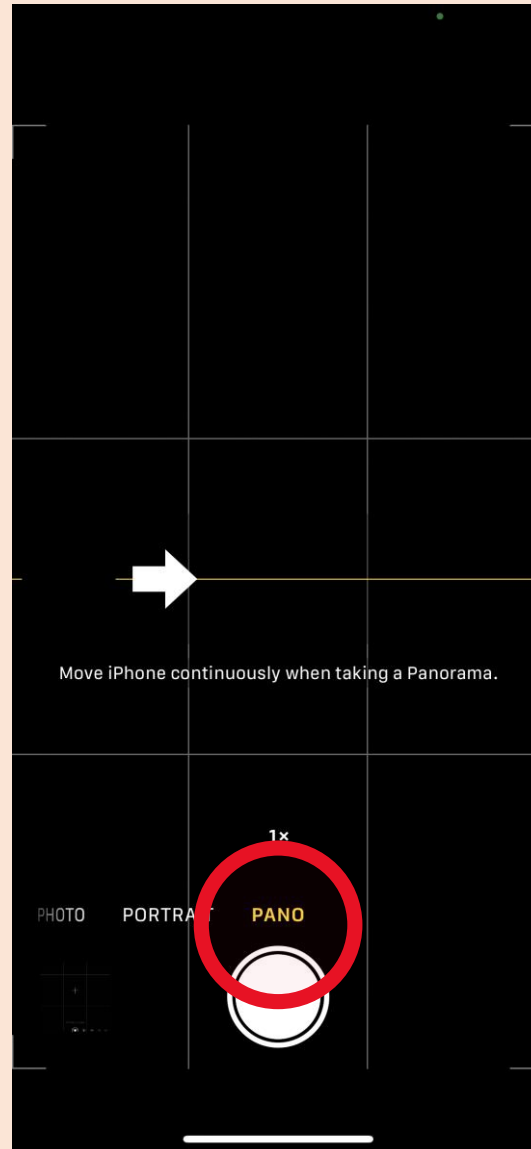
Portrait Mode

Panorama Photograph

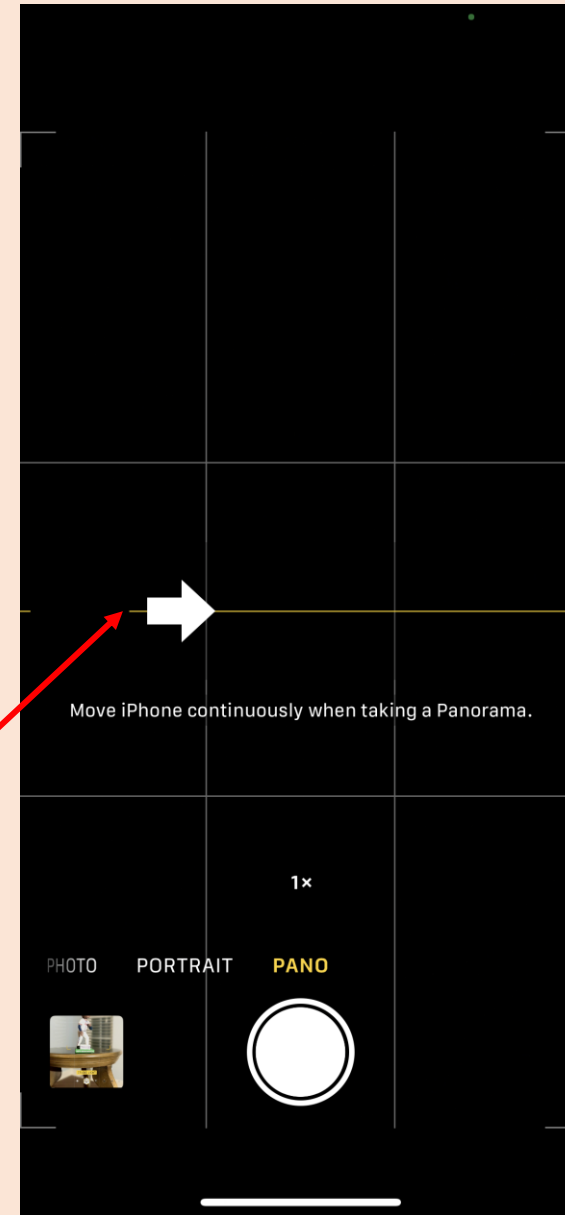
Captures a Complete Scene Larger than One Shot

Screen Shot Pano Mode



Pano Mode Screen Shot

Hold the shutter button down and slowly move the phone. Keep the arrow on the center line.

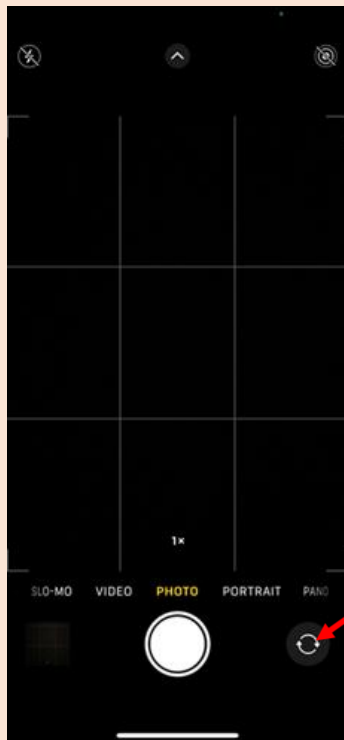

Selfie Photo Mode

- Used for Zoom calls
- Photos of you and group at various locations
- Fun outings
- Everyone is doing selfies

Burst

Examples of When to Use Burst Mode

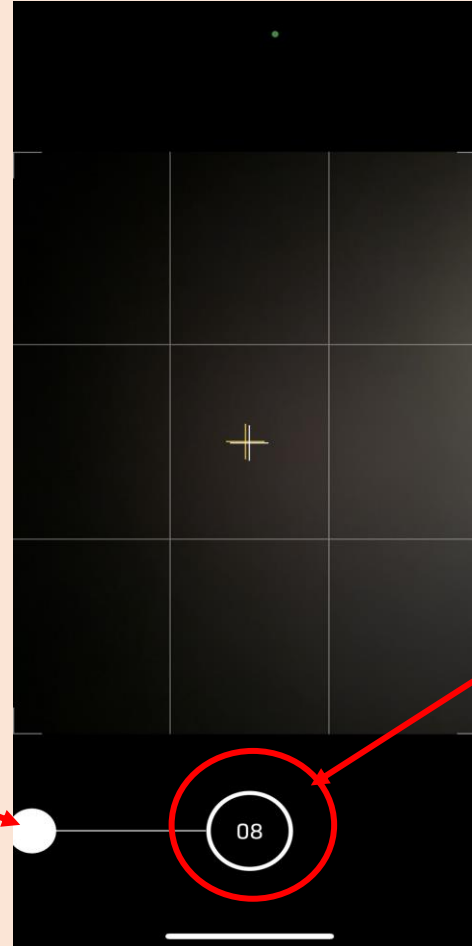
- You want to stop the action with a precise shot
 - Capture a batter hitting a ball
 - Goalie making a save
 - Blowing out birthday candles
 - An eagle catching a fish
 - Blue Angels making flight maneuvers
 - Receiver catching a touchdown pass
 - A baseball player running after a hit
- Professional photographers use this technique all the time to capture the “perfect action” shot

How to Begin the BURST Mode

Photo Screen



Slide shutter button to left and hold. iPhone will take a burst of photos as long as you hold shutter button

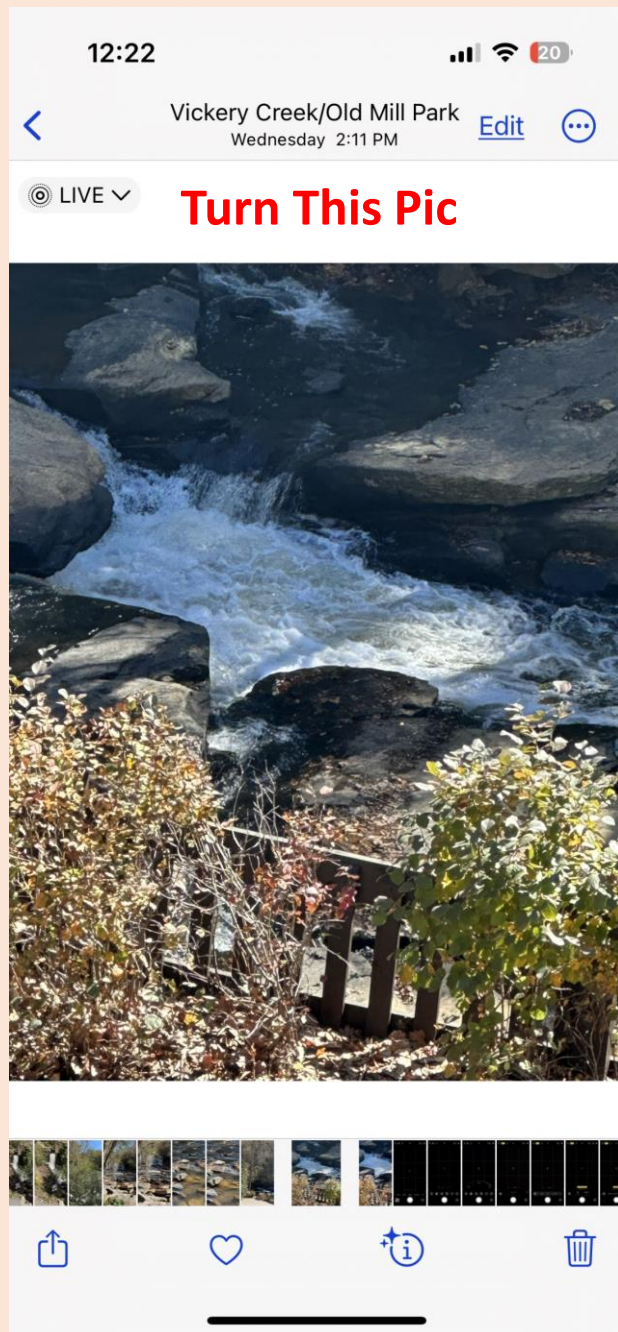
Number of photo taken in the burst

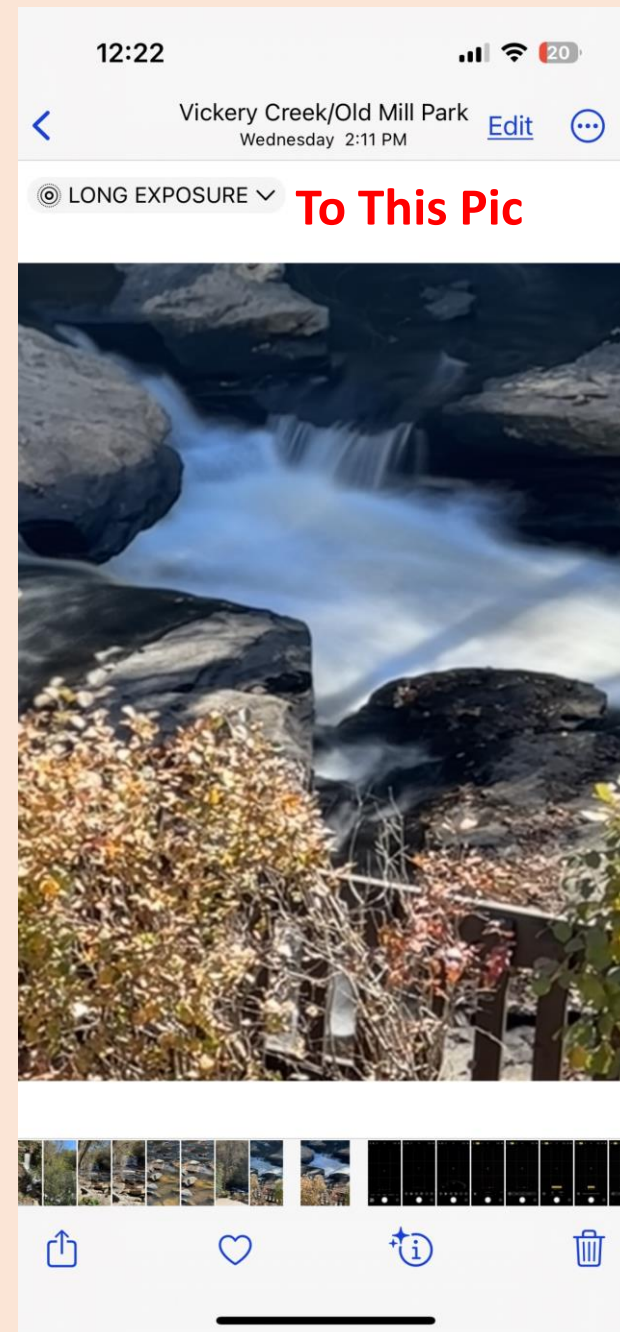

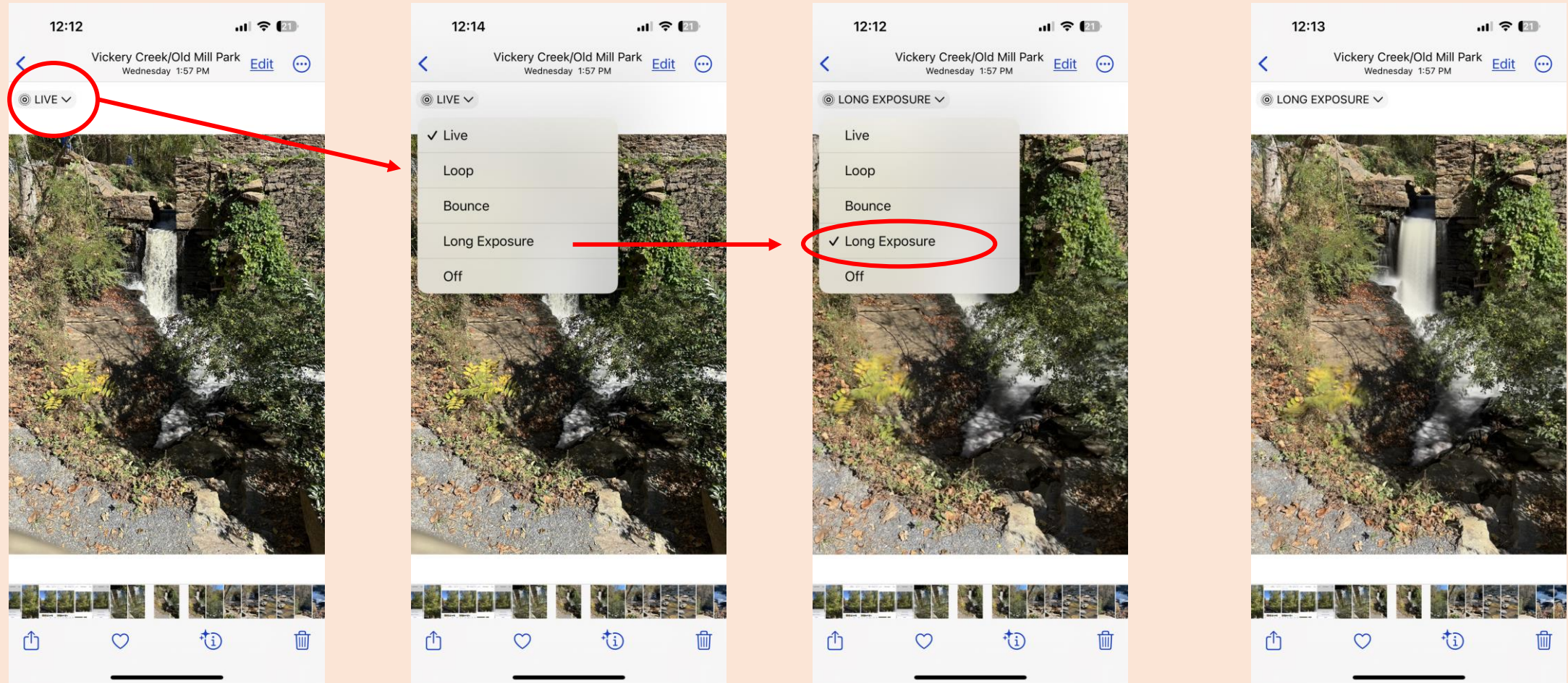

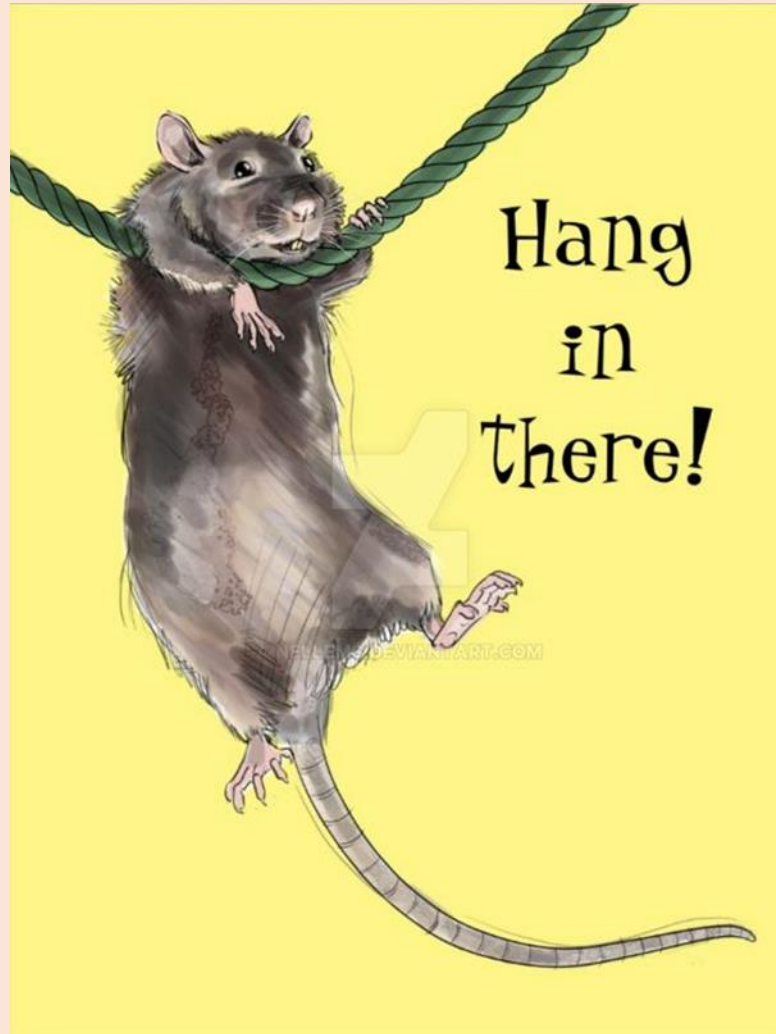


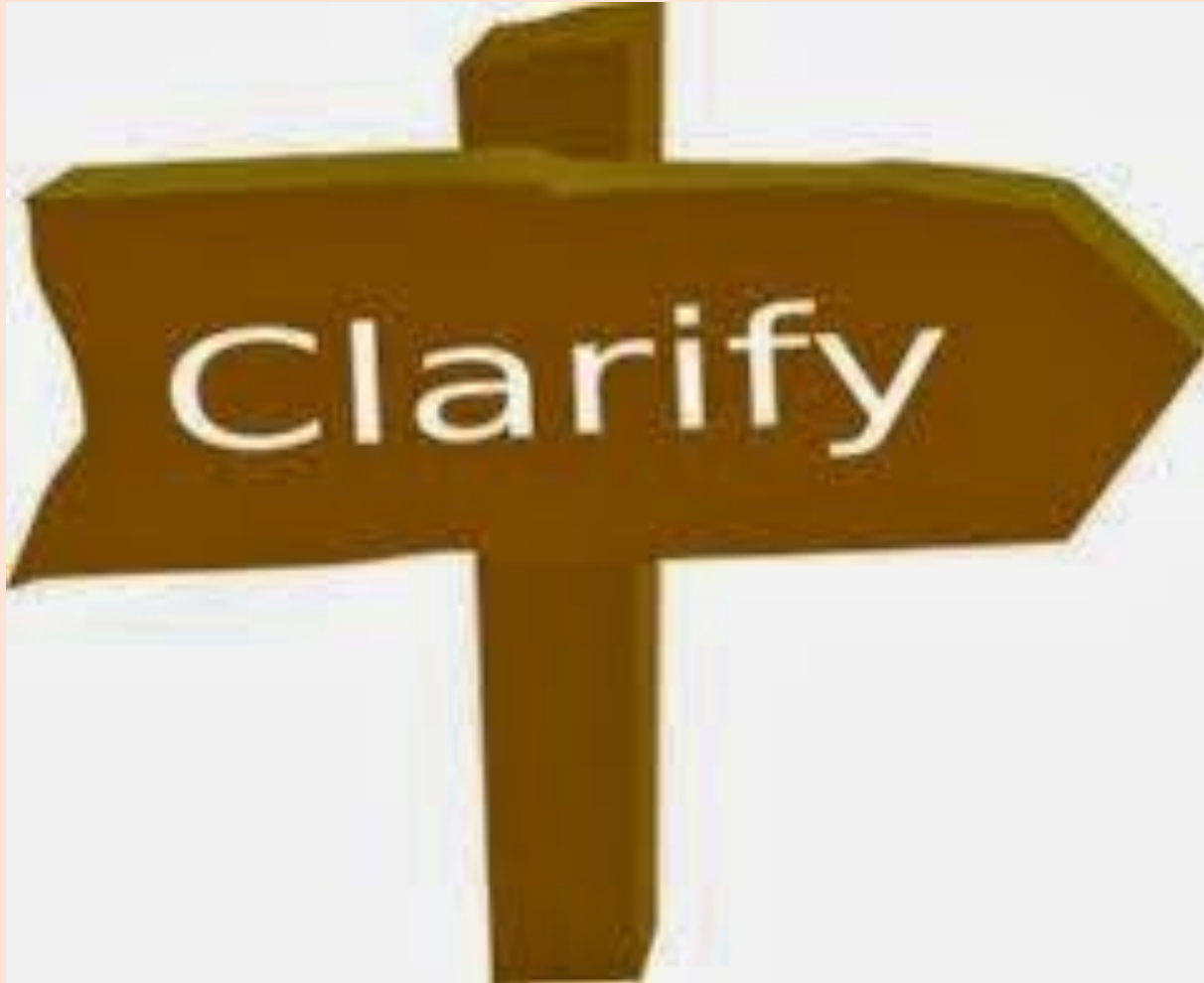
Live Selection Option

How Does LIVE Option Work ?

- With Live On – the iPhone takes several photos automatically, from you pressing the shutter button once
- iPhone selects a “Key” photo from the others

huh?

iPhone LIVE Option Details

Photo taken with iPhone with LIVE option “on”



Final image

You did not have to do anything. iPhone selected the photo. Only thing you did was to take photograph with “LIVE” on.

Details of same photo in edit mode



This one “key” photo is selected by iPhone from a series of several still images

This is “key” photo

Why Use LIVE Option

- Many use “Live Option” for people shots (poor expression, eyes closed, looking the other way, etc)
- Everything else is great except one person has their eyes closed for example
- Need to get rid of the bad photo in a simple way
- So that you select the photo you want
- The “Live Option” let's you do that

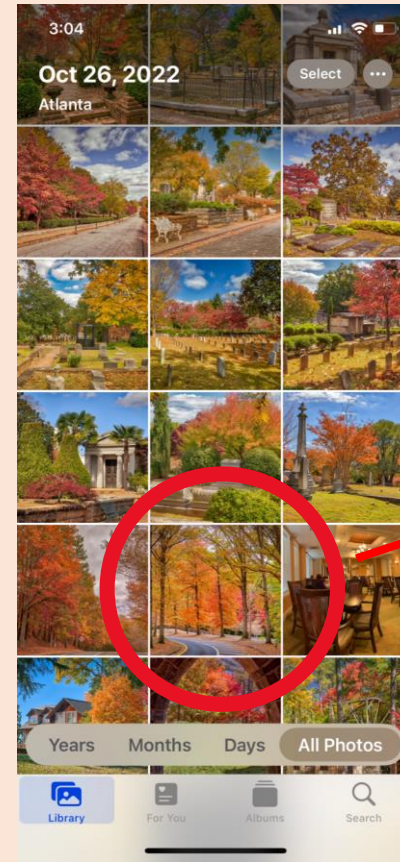
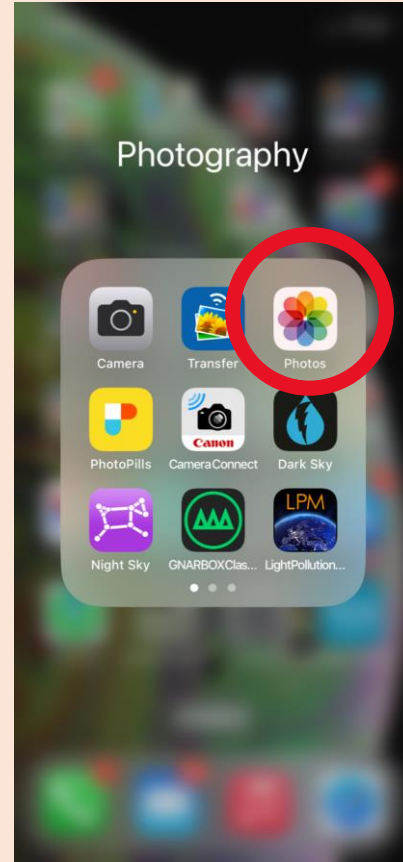
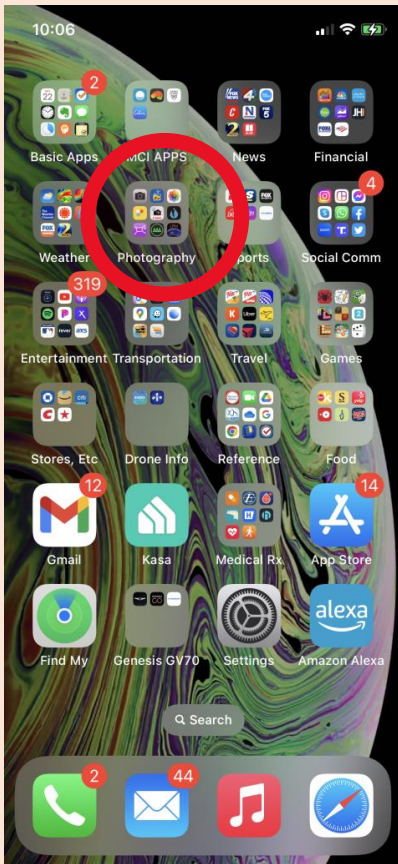
How Do I see The Photos on My iPhone ?

Two ways to get to your photos

1. Look at Last Photo Taken by Phone



2. Look at Photo Files App on Home Screen

Either Way Gets You To The Same Point

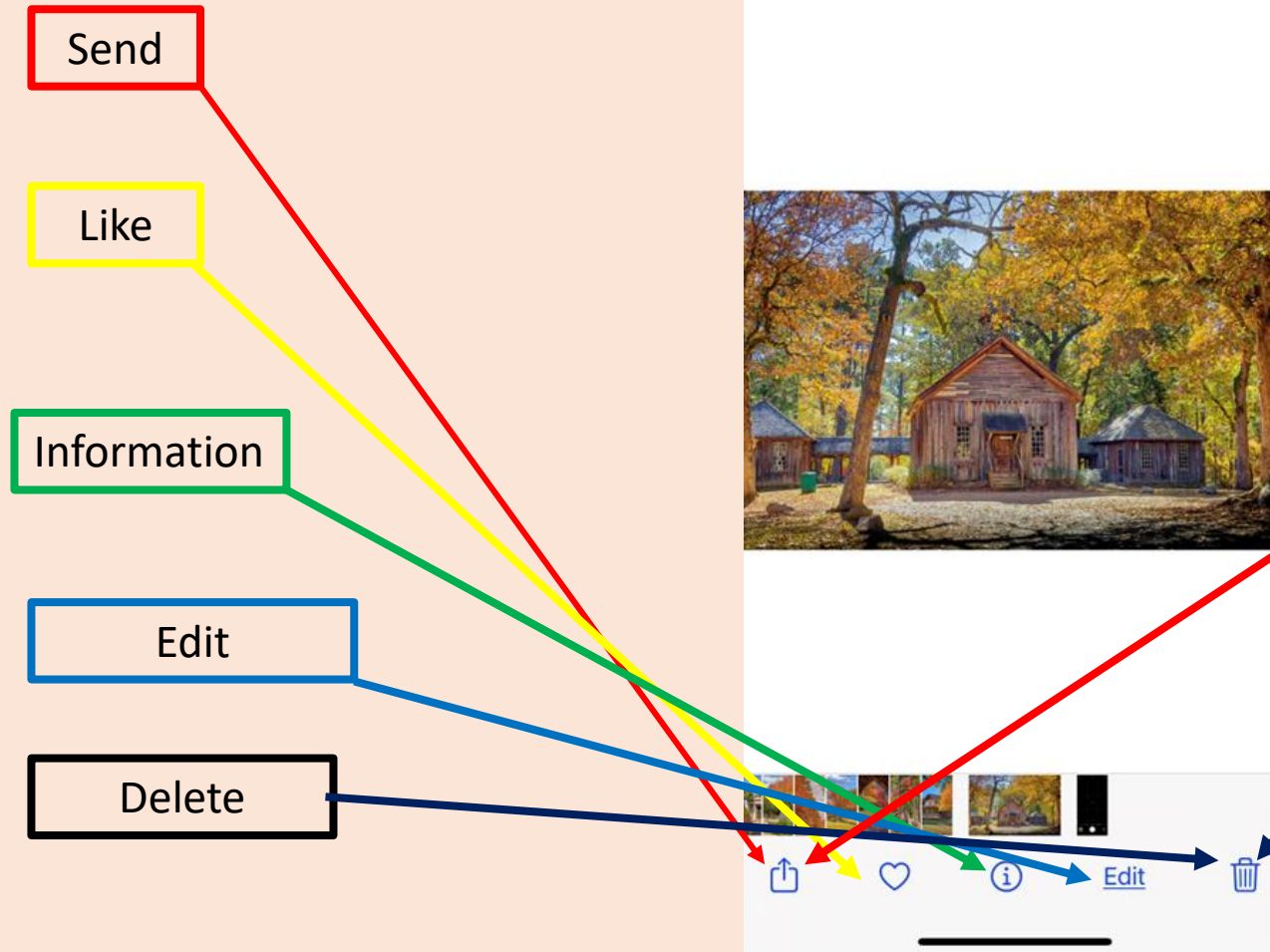

99% of time you will only use two options:

- Send
- Delete

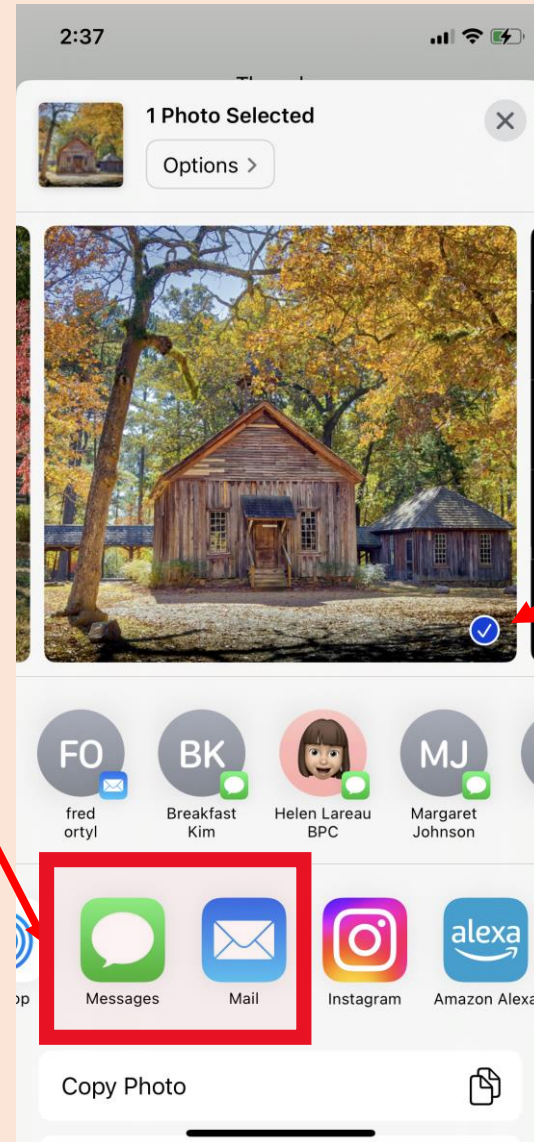
Send

Identifies all the ways to “SEND” the item.

You are primarily going to send photographs by email or text (messages)

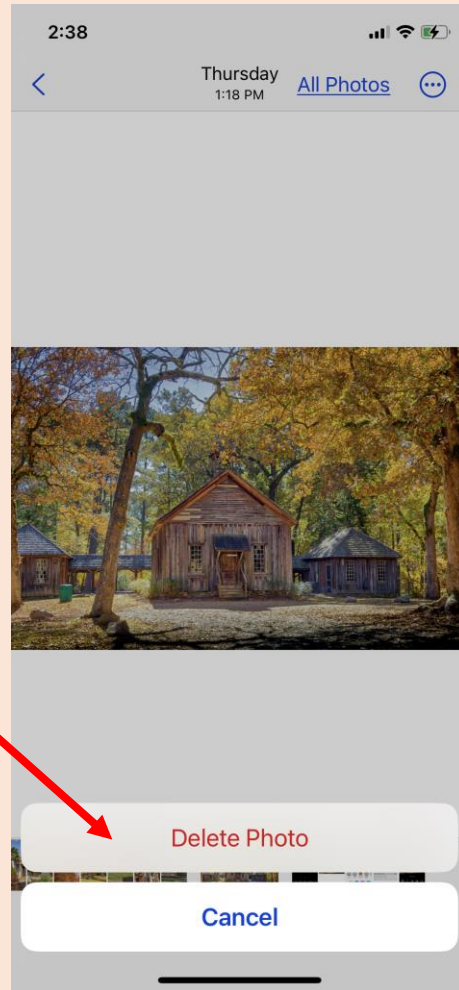
Detailed slide on how to send in appendix with an exercise to take and email a photo

Can “Send” more than one photo by checking the small circle in each photo that you want to send



Delete

Press “Delete Photo” to
remove photo from camera

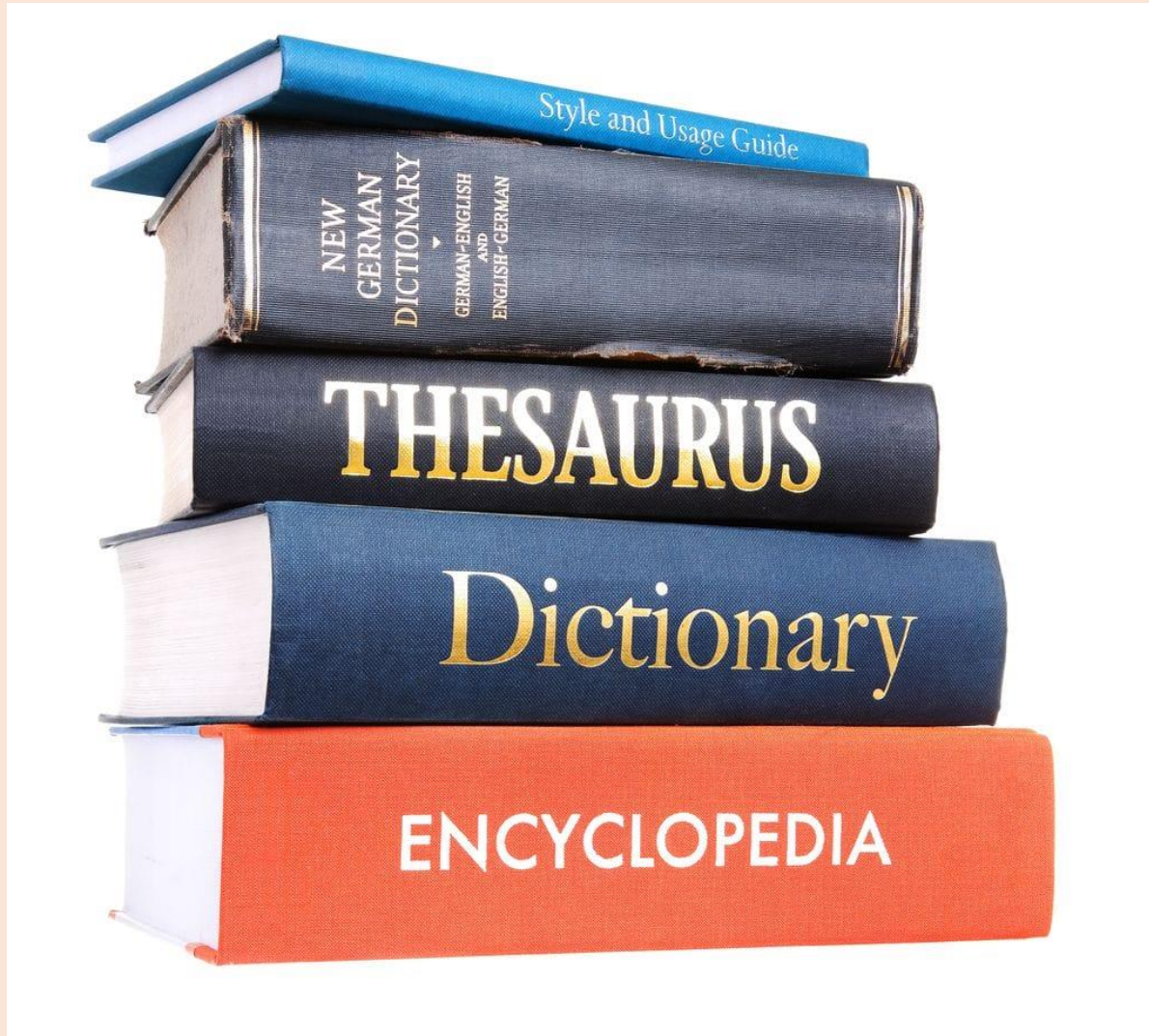

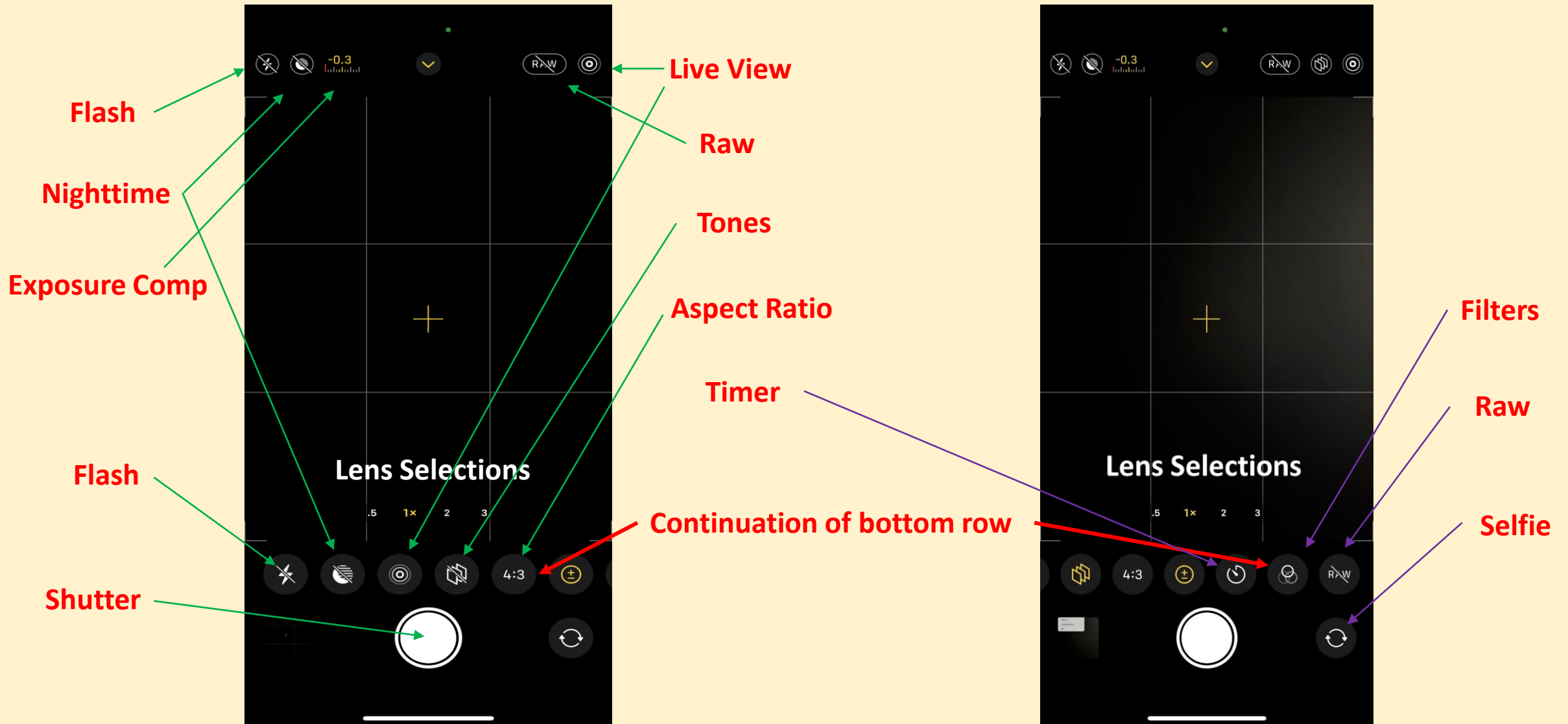

What Should the Settings Be For a Normal Photo ?

Advanced Settings – Newer iPhones

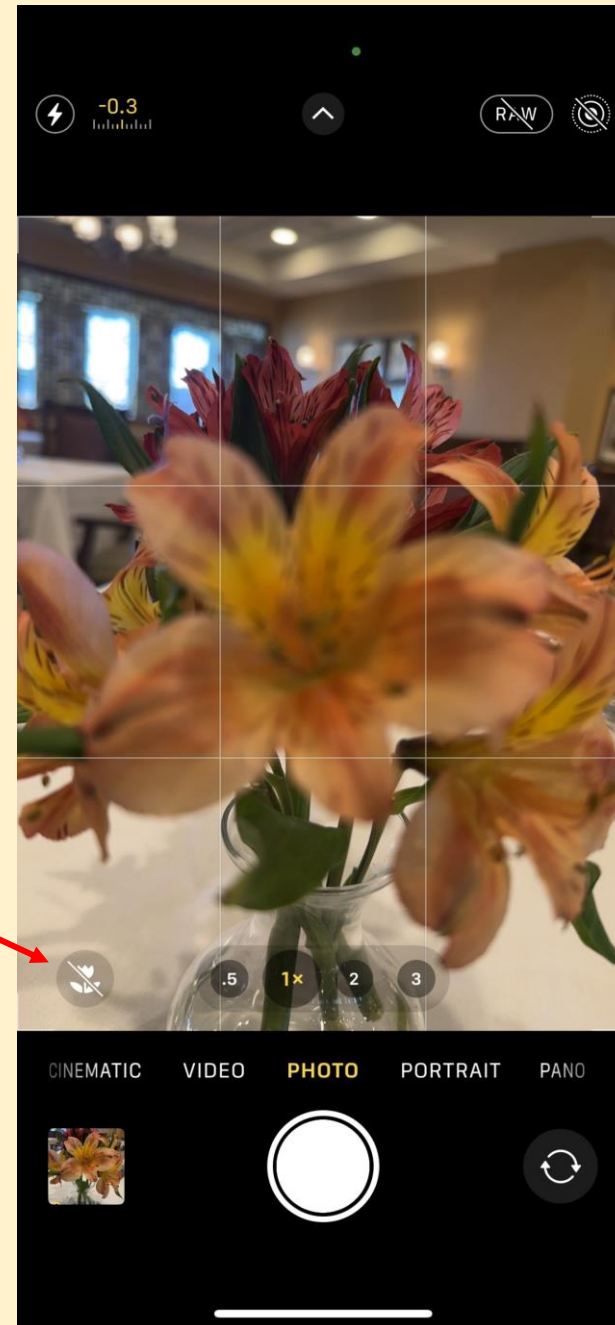
- Flash – Options (Auto, On, & Off) – Your discretion
- * Night Exposure – (Auto, On, Max Seconds) – leave off
- Live View – (Auto, On, Off) – Leave on
- * Tones – (Many Options) – leave as Standard or change to (Rich Contrast)
- Aspect Ration – Leave at 4:3
- * Exposure Compensation : Range of Options – (-2 to + 2) leave alone or -0.3
- Timer (Off, 3 sec, or 10 sec) – Leave off unless necessary for special shot
- Filters – Many options – Leave on default
- * RAW – Leave Off

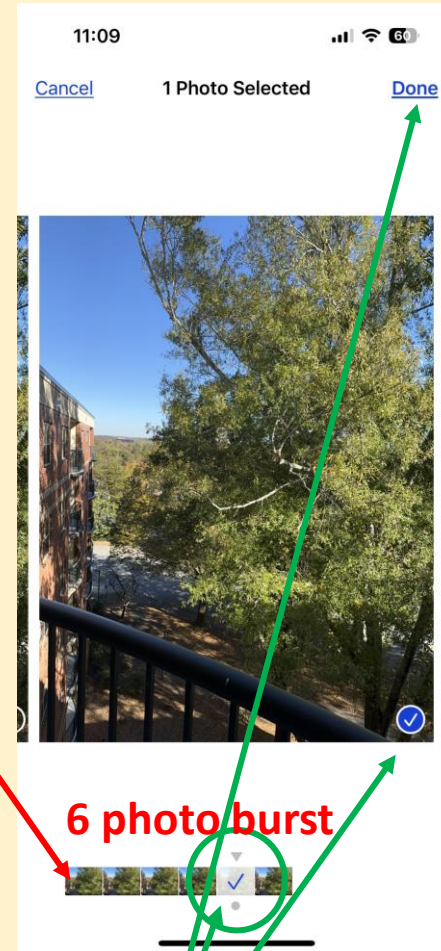

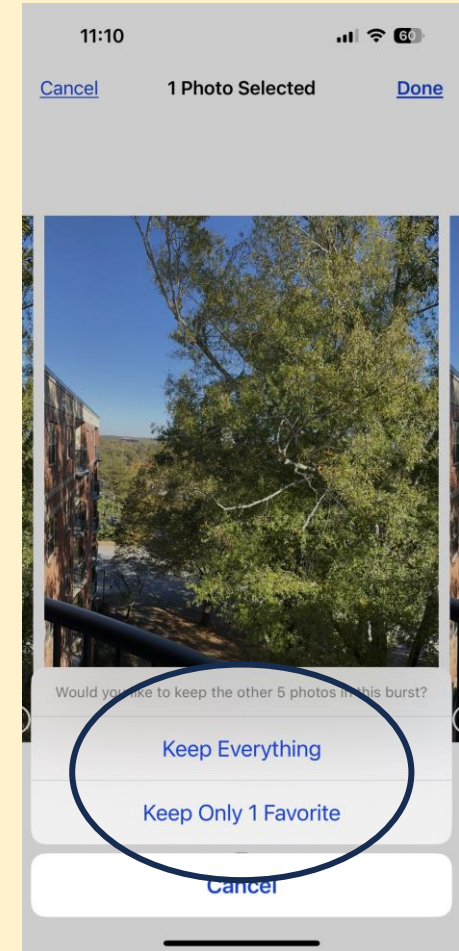
iPhone Burst Technique



Slide shutter to left and Hold. Shutter keeps taking photos (Burst). 12 Photos



Select photo you want



Keep the photo you want, delete rest of photos.

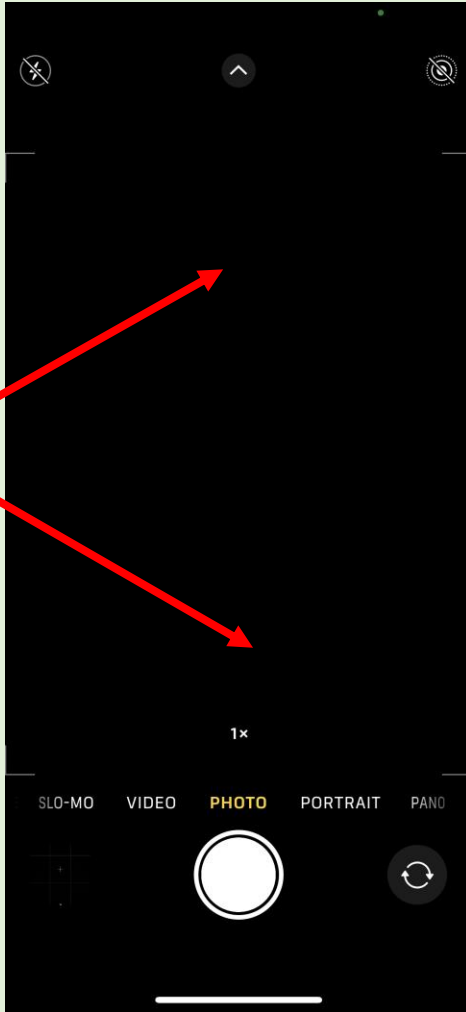



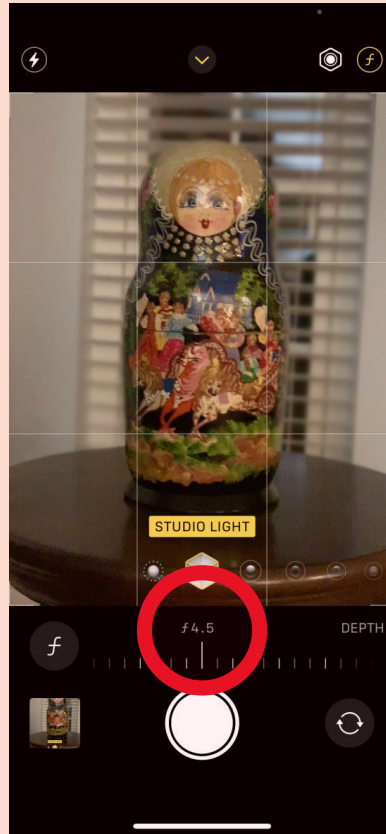

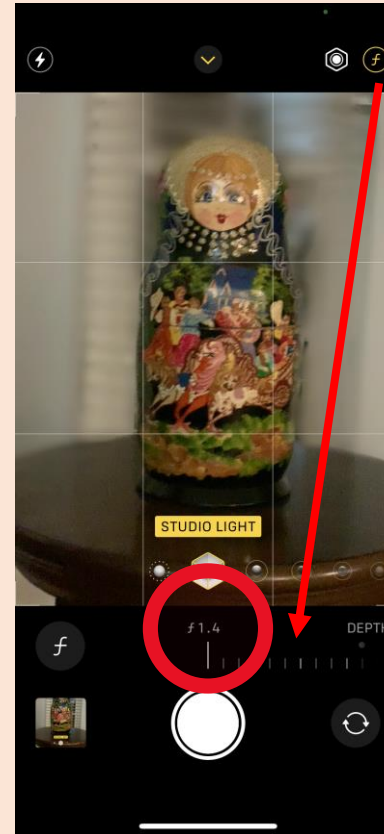

In Portrait Mode You Can Change (Additional Settings Beyond Photo Mode) Aperture Opening, Light Source, Light Intensity, & Tones

Aperture Options

- f1.4 – largest lens opening. Most blurred background
- f16 – smallest lens opening. Least blurred background

- Natural Light
- Studio Light
- Contour Light
- Stage Light
- Stage Light Mono
- High Key Light Mono

Light Intensity

- 0 – Least Light
- 100 – Most Light

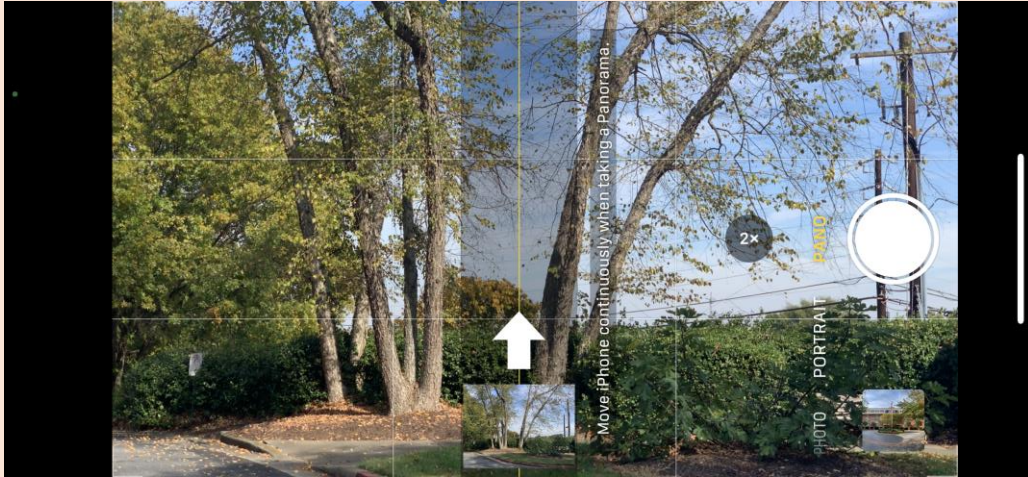
In Portrait Mode, settings can get complicated in a hurry

What Settings to Use in Portrait - Recommendations

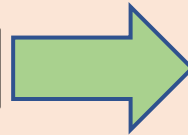
- Until proficient in portrait settings – use
- Flash – Depends on environment
- Light – Natural Light
- Light Intensity – Default setting
- Self-Timer – Off
- Tones – Original
- Focal length – Default setting (only one to consider changing – use previous slide as your guide)

Little Used Pano Effect

Hold the iPhone horizontally
Set to Pano mode
Hold down shutter
Move the iPhone slowly up the subject

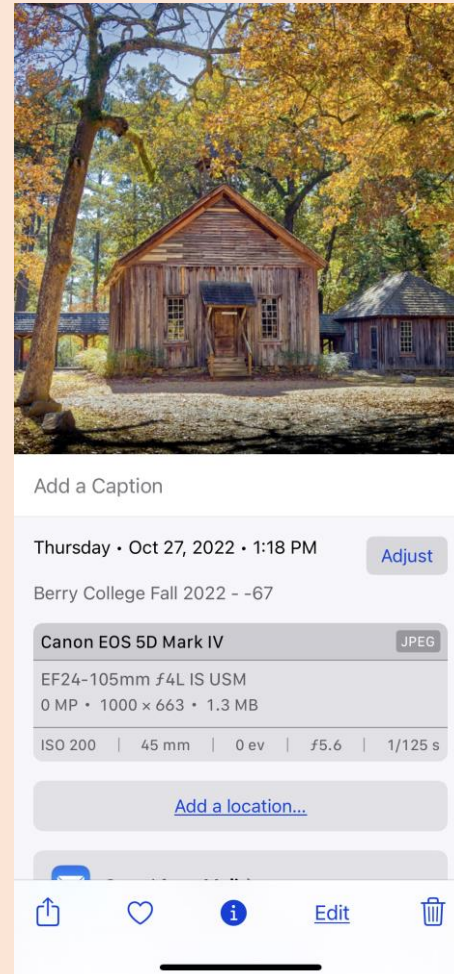


Resulting in a beautiful vertical photo of the subject



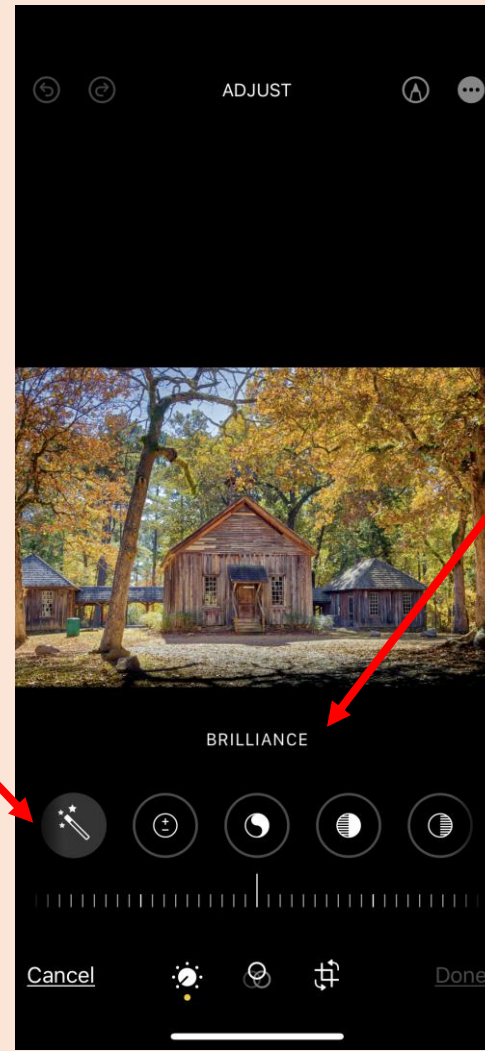

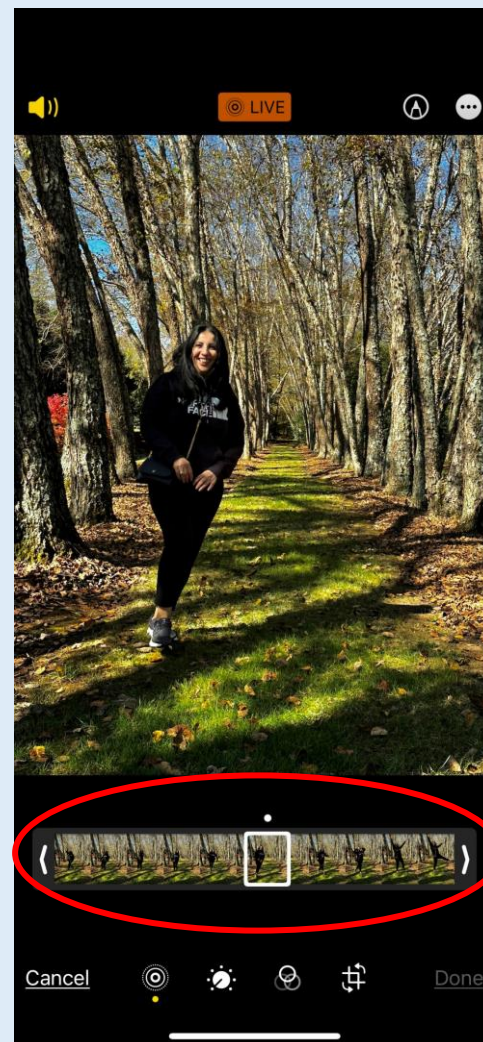
How To Get To Selected Photo From Key Photo In Same Video Series



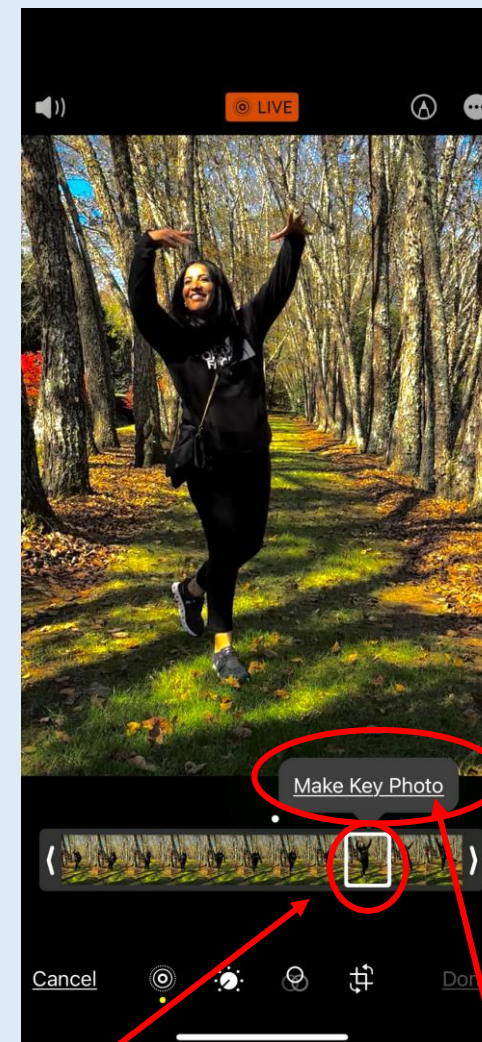
Step 1 – Tap Edit



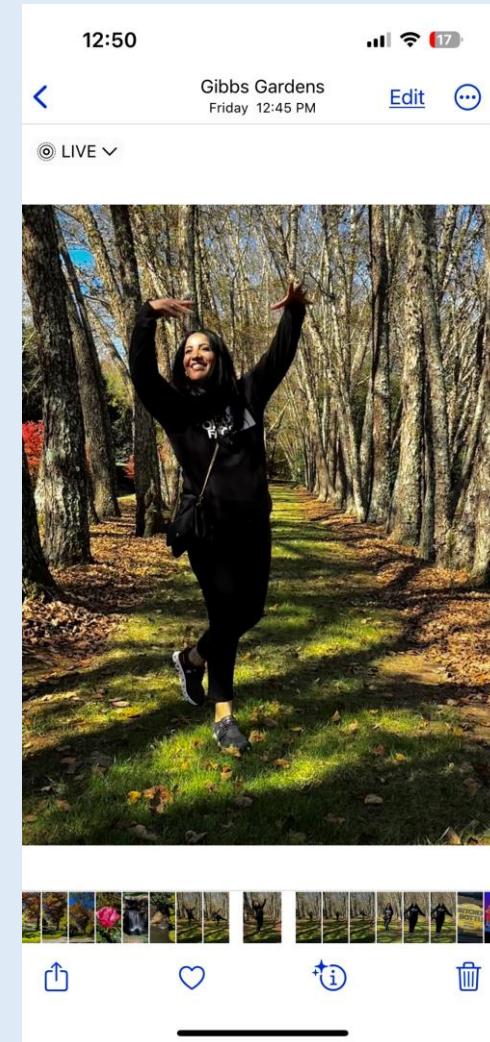
Step 2- Tap LIVE Icon



Step 3 – Scroll taken pics



Step 4 – ID pic you want & make it your Key photo by tapping on wording



Step 5 – Tap Done & this is your selected photo
